Mother And Child Reunion	2:59	Paul Simon	1972, from his first solo album after Bridge Over Troubled Water. One of the earliest songs by a white musician to feature prominent elements of reggae - recorded in Jamaica with Jimmy Cliff's backing group.
Dance Little Sister	3:55	Terence Trent D'Arby	Born Terence Trent Howard in 1962, now known as Sananda Maitreya. From 1987 album Introducing the Hardline According to Terence Trent D'Arby
Soul Sister, Brown Sugar	2:30	Sam & Dave	The tenor (higher) voice was Samuel David Moore and the baritone/tenor (lower) voice was Dave Prater. Reached no 15 in 1969.
You And Your Sister	3:14	This Mortal Coil	1991, from Blood, their third and final album released by 4AD. Sung by Kim Deal (Pixies) and Tanya Donnelly (Throwing Muses)
Sister Europe	5:39	The Psychedelic Furs	From the band's 1980 first album, The Psychedelic Furs. They traditionally opened their live shows with this during the early part of their career
Little Sister	2:33	Elvis Presley	1961, written by Doc Pomus and Mort Shuman, double A-side with (Marie's the Name) His Latest Flame.
Little sister	2:54	Queens Of The Stone Age	2004. First single released from their fourth album Lullabies to Paralyze. Lead singer Josh Homme says that this song inspired by the "sort of sexual twist" of the song "Little Sister," which Elvis Presley recorded in 1961.
Mother Popcorn	3:20	James Brown	1969, inspired by the popular dance the Popcorn. Besides this track, Brown also recorded "The Popcorn," "Low Down Popcorn," and "Let a Man Come in and Do the Popcorn."
Me And Baby Brother	3:29	War	1973, from album Deliver the Word
Daddy Cool	3:29	Boney M	1976, their second single. Percussive intro by producer Frank Farian playing on his teeth with a pencil and it is his deep voice that sings: "She's crazy like a fool"
My Perfect Cousin	2:37	The Undertones	Inspired by an actual male cousin of one of the band members — was written in the summer of 1979.
Brother Gorilla	2:52	Jake Thackray	1972. Adapted from Le Gorille by Georges Brassens, from 1952. Has a strong anti- death penalty stance.
Cousin Dupree	5:30	Steely Dan	First single from their 2000 album Two Against Nature. The song describes the desire a young man (Dupree) has for his attractive cousin.
Mother's Little Helper	2:48	The Rolling Stones	From 1966 album Aftermath. The song deals with the sudden popularity of diazepam, a mild tranquilizer, among housewives and the ease of obtaining it from their GPs.
Son Of My Father	3:10	Chicory Tip	Written by Giorgio Moroder and Pete Bellotte. Spent 3 weeks at number 1 in 1972. Notable as the first UK number one single to prominently feature a synthesizer, in this case a Moog
Rag Mama Rag	3:02	Band	1969. Lead pianist Richard Manuel played drums, drummer Levon Helm played mandolin and sang lead, and bassist Rick Danko played a fiddle.
My Brother Jake	2:57	Free	1971, written by lead singer Paul Rodgers and bass guitarist Andy Fraser
Me and My Uncle	3:04	Grateful Dead	Composed by John Phillips of The Mamas and the Papas, originally by Judy Collins. It relates the journey of a narrator and his uncle from southern Colorado towards western Texas. 1978.
Second Cousin	3:20	Flamin Groovies	1970, from Flamingo, their second studio album. The group have been called one of the forerunners of punk rock, and they also had a major influence on the power pop genre.
Son Of A Preacher Man	2:29	Dusty Springfield	From 1968 album Dusty in Memphis. Song was originally offered to Aretha Franklin, who turned it down.
Truck Drivin' Son Of A Gun	2:10	Dave Dudley	1971. His signature song was "Six Days on the Road"
Amen Brother	3:03	The Bamboos	A soul/funk band from Melbourne, Australia. Featured on Listen Hear album, 2007.
