	Memphis Soul Stew	2:57	King Curtis	1967. This minor classic probably has secured his legacy.
	Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	Keep On Churnin' (Till The Butter Come)	2:54	Wynonie Harris	Born 1915, Wynonie Harris, born in Omaha, Nebraska, was an American blues shouter and rhythm and blues singer of upbeat songs, featuring humorous, often racy lyrics.
	(Do The) Mashed Potato Pt1	1:48	Nat Kendrick & The Swans	Recorded by James Brown with his band in 1959 and released as a two-part single in 1960. For contractual reasons the recording was credited to "Nat Kendrick and the Swans." Has Carlton "King" Coleman on vocals
	Peanuts	2:29	Little Joe & The Thrillers	1957. Featured Joseph Cook's falsetto as the lead, reportedly an influence on Frankie Valli, who also recorded "Peanuts". Their first single was "Do the Slop," which sparked a new dance craze
	Peanut Vendor	2:10	Alvin 'Red' Tyler And The Gyros	a Cuban song based on a street-seller's cry, and known as a pregón. It is possibly the most famous piece of music created by a Cuban musician. Used in the fifth episode of season two of the TV series Breaking Bad.
	Jambalaya	2:23	Fats Domino	A Louisiana Creole dish of Spanish and French influence, with chicken, sausage, rice, shrimp, celery, and spices. Similar to Spanish paella
	Hey Pete! Let's Eat More Meat	3:05	Dizzy Gillespie	From album Dizzy in Greece, recorded in 1956 in New York and released on the Verve label.
	Yes, We Have No Bananas (Featuring June Hutton)	2:41	Johnny Mercer & The Pied Pipers	Born John Herndon, 1909 – 1976, was an American lyricist, songwriter and singer. He was also a co-founder of Capitol Records.
	Chicken Crazy	3:29	Joe Tex	From mid sixties. Had disco hit with Ain't Gonna Bump No More (With No Big Fat Woman) in 1977.
	Crawfish	1:51	Elvis Presley	Opening song for his 1958 movie King Creole and featuring Jean "Kitty" Bilbrew. A favourite of Joe Strummer's
	Beans And Cornbread	2:49	Louis Jordan	From 1981, beans and cornbread was also the traditional meal served to NASA launch crews following a successful space shuttle launch. This from 1949.
	Big Rock Candy Mountain	2:18	Harry McClintock	First recorded by in 1928 by McClintock, it is about a hobo's idea of paradise - a place where "hens lay soft boiled eggs" and there are "cigarette trees."
	Dan The Banana Man	3:09	Nettles Brothers String Band	Formed by Norman Nettles (vocals, guitar) in Dallas in 1941.
	Cigarettes And Coffee Blues	2:37	Lefty Frizzell	Born William Orville in 1928, got the nickname Lefty at age 14 after a schoolyard scrap. This from 1958.
	A Taste of Honey	2:45	Herb Alpert & The Tijuana Brass	1965 album, Whipped Cream & Other Delights. Originally written 1960 Broadway version of the 1958 British play A Taste of Honey
	Pulling Mussels (From The Shell)	4:00	Squeeze	From 1980 album Argybargy. An "observation of the British working class" and "offers a series of detailed snapshots of the different walks of life on a seaside holiday.
	Milk And Alcohol	2:51	Dr. Feelgood	Wilko Johnson left in 1977 - just before this, their biggest hit. Written by Nick Lowe and Gypie Mayo, who replaced Wilko on guitar.
	Peaches	4:04	The Stranglers	One of the big summer hits of 1977 in the UK, controversial because of its sexual content: the song's narrator is girl-watching on a crowded beach one hot summer day.
	Eat to the Beat	2:40	Blondie	Title song from fourth studio album, 1979.
	Faron Young	3:43	Prefab Sprout	Frontman Paddy McAloon formed band in 1978 in Newcastle. From second album, released June 1985. Faron Young was an American country music singer and songwriter from the early 1950s - hits with "Hello Walls" and "It's Four in the Morning"
	Breakfast In America	2:39	Supertramp	Title song of their sixth album, released 1979. In France, the album is the biggest-selling English language album of all time.
	Chicken Shack	2:30	Amos Milburn	A 1948 jump-boogie style song. He was one of the first performers to switch from sophisticated jazz arrangements to a louder "jump" blues.
	Saturday Night Fish Fry	2:51	Chuck Miller	1959. Charles Nelson "Chuck" Miller (1924 - 2000)
	Mother Popcorn	3:20	James Brown	Apparently, the "mother" of the song's title was a term for a big bottom and popcorn being a dance.
	Green Onions	2:51	Byron Lee & The Dragonaires	Original 1962.
	Banana Splits	1:54	The Dickies	Original was theme song for the children's television program The Banana Splits Adventure Hour, 1968. This version reached #7 in the UK Singles Chart in 1979.
