Couldn't Get It Right	3:10	Climax Blues Band	Originally known as the Climax Chicago Blues Band, formed in Stafford in 1968. Vocalist and harmonica player Colin Cooper died in 2008. Top 10 in UK, 1976
Lonely Boy	4:21	Andrew Gold	1977. Second verse of the song features backing vocals by Linda Ronstadt (for whom Gold had previously worked as a producer and backing musician). It follows the life of a child who feels neglected by his parents after the birth of a younger sister.
Heart On My Sleeve	3:18	Gallagher & Lyle	Scottish duo, comprising singer-songwriters Benny Gallagher and Graham Lyle. They were founding members of the band McGuinness Flint and wrote the 1970 UK chart hit "When I'm Dead and Gone". From 1976 album Breakaway
Arms Of Mary	2:38	Sutherland Brothers & Quiver	Gavin and Iain, both from Aberdeenshire. They wrote Sailing in 1972, Rod Stewart recorded it in 1975 and is still his biggest-selling single in the UK. This from 1975 album Reach for the Sky
Ride Like The Wind	4:32	Christopher Cross	1979. Christopher Cross dedicated this song to Lowell George, formerly of the band Little Feat, who had died in 1979. It features backing vocals by Michael McDonald and a guitar solo by Cross.
I'd Really Love To See You Tonight	2:39	England Dan & John Ford Coley	An American soft rock duo composed of Danny Wayland "England Dan" Seals and John Edward "John Ford" Coley. 1976.
Peg	3:57	Steely Dan	From 1977 album Aja. Michael McDonald can be heard providing multi-tracked backup vocals in the choruses. "Peg" was heavily sampled on the 1989 De La Soul song, "Eye Know"
Get It Right The Next Time	4:41	Gerry Rafferty	1979 from Night Owl, the follow up to City to City from the previous year.
Stuck In The Middle With You	3:24	Stealer's Wheel	1972. Written by Gerry Rafferty and Joe Egan. Used in Quentin Tarantino's debut film Reservoir Dogs. Formed in Paisley, Renfrewshire in 1972.
Every Day Hurts	4:06	Sad Café	Formed in Manchester in 1976, they had biggest success with Façades album in 1979. Frontman Paul Young went on to achieve greater chart success as the co-lead singer of Mike + The Mechanics.
Silly Love	4:00	10cc	1974, from the album Sheet Music. Lead vocal and guitar by Lol Creme.
Say You Don't Mind	3:20	Colin Blunstone	Best known as a member of the rock band The Zombies, also worked on various albums with The Alan Parsons Project. This got to no 15 in 1972.
Girls, Girls, Girls	3:04	Sailor	1975, written by the group's lead singer and 12-string guitar player, Georg Kajanus.
Sky High	2:54	Jigsaw	The song was main title theme to the film The Man from Hong Kong, was a worldwide hit in the latter part of 1975. In Australia the group was called "British Jigsaw" due to the existence of a local band of the same name.
Rich Girl	2:24	Hall & Oates	1977, it became their first of six number-one singles on the "Billboard" Hot 100.
In a Broken Dream	3:41	Python Lee Jackson/Rod Stewart	1970. Originally formed in Sydney in 1965, spotted by DJ John Peel whilst on tour in London. Peel brought Rod Stewart in for a session and recorded it. He was paid with a new set of seat covers for his car.
Amoureuse	4:08	Kiki Dee	Title of a French composition by Véronique Sanson introduced on her 1972 album of the same name. Rendered in English the song became a hit single for Kiki Dee in 1973, Helen Reddy had a hit with it in 1975 - but called Emotion.
Oh Lori	3:20	Alessi Brothers	The duo are identical twin brothers, Billy and Bobby Alessi. Reached no. 4 in the UK in 1977.
A Horse With No Name	4:14	America	Released in 1971, it was the their first and most successful single. Due to the song's resemblance to the work of Neil Young from the same time period, it is occasionally mistaken for being written and sung by Young.
Isn't It Time	4:03	The Babys	1977. Featured vocalist/bassist John Waite - who went on to have a hit with Missing You in 1984.
