You Little Thief (Single Version)	4:35	Feargal Sharkey	1986, written by member of Tom Petty's band Benmont Tench about his relationship with Maria McKee who had written Sharkey's previous hit single "A Good Heart", based on Tench.
You've Got My Number (Why Don't You Use It!)	2:39	The Undertones	Released on October 1979 and reached number 32 in the UK charts. Was one of only two singles released by The Undertones not to be included on any of their albums at the time of their original release.
Hey Venus	3:14	That Petrol Emotion	1980. Band was formed by guitarist John O'Neill, main songwriter previously with The Undertones.
Songs of love	3:24	The Divine Comedy	Neil Hannon composed the theme music for the sitcoms Father Ted and The IT Crowd, the former later reworked into "Songs of Love", a track on The Divine Comedy's breakthrough 1996 album Casanova. He also wrote "My Lovely Horse"
Big Sur	3:11	The Thrills	Formed in 2001 in Dublin, Ireland. Their big break came in 2003 with their debut album, So Much for the City, which became an Irish number one and charted at number 3 in the UK.
Uncle Pat	3:13	Ash	1994, released as the third single from their album Trailer. Formed in Downpatrick in 1992.
Here Come The Good Times	3:37	A House	From 1994 album Wide-Eyed and Ignorant. Their only single to reach UK charts at number 40. It re-recorded by members of the Irish soccer squad, Irish celebrities and boy band members for use as the official Irish 2002 World Cup anthem.
Real Real Gone	3:42	Van Morrison	Included on his 1990 album Enlightenment. Van, born in Belfast 1945.
I'll Tell Me Ma	2:31	Van Morrison & The Chieftains	18 studio album by Van the Man and is a collaboration with the traditional Irish musical group the Chieftains, released in 1988. This was well-known children's song in the 19th century.
Paddy Mcgintays Goat	2:32	Val Doonican	Released on the Decca label as the B Side of "Delaney's Donkey". Although it failed to chart, it became one of the song's most readily associated with Doonican during his five decade plus career.
Goodbye It's 1987	4:15	Microdisney	From The Clock Comes Down The Stairs (1985), Rough Trade. From Cork
Only Losers Take The Bus	3:09	Fatima Mansions	1989, opening track from their debut album Against Nature. Formed in 1988 by Cork singer/keyboardist Cathal Coughlan, formerly of Microdisney.
A Girl Called Johnny	3:56	Waterboys	From eponymous debut album, 1981. Whilst Mike Scott is indeed a Scot, The fiddle player, Steve Wickham is from Dublin. Described by Mike Scott as "the world's greatest rock fiddle player"
Don't Believe A Word	2:20	Thin Lizzy	1976, from Johnny the Fox, their seventh studio album. This was the single from it, reached number 12 in UK. Phil Collins guests on the album.
Mandinka	3:46	Sinead O'Connor	From 1987 album The Lion and the Cobra. Mandinkas are an African tribe. They're mentioned in book Roots by Alex Haley.
Gloria	2:42	Them	Wriiten by Van Morrison and released as the B-side of "Baby, Please Don't Go" in 1964.
Gloria	4:13	U2	Opening track and second single from the band's 1981 album, October. It features a chorus in Latin, from "Gloria in Excelsis Deo." It was one of their lowest-charting singles on the UK singles chart, peaking at number 55.
The Sound Of Silence	2:56	Bachelors	Written by Paul Simon between 1963 and 1964. The Bachelors had a hit in Ireland and the UK with the song in 1966. Originally called The Harmonichords, but changed their name to The Bachelors "because that's the kind of boy a girl likes."
Where's Me Jumper?	3:09	Sultans Of Ping	Band's name is a play on the Dire Straits song "Sultans of Swing". Released 1992
Sally MacLennane	2:45	The Pogues	Composed by Shane MacGowan and featured on the band's second album, Rum, Sodomy And The Lash. The album's title is taken from Winston Churchill quote, "Don't talk to me about naval tradition. It's nothing but rum, sodomy, and the lash."
Suspect Device	2:43	Stiff Little Fingers	Band started out as Highway Star (after the Deep Purple song), doing rock covers, until they discovered punk. 1979, their first single.
Don't Go	3:44	Hothouse Flowers	From their 1988 album People, and is the most successful debut album in Irish history
