Nature Boy	4:54	Nick Cave & The Bad Seeds	2004, from double album Abattoir Blues / The Lyre of Orpheus, their thirteenth studio album.
Solitary Man	2:33	Neil Diamond	It was inspired by the Beatles' song 'Michelle,' which was also written in a minor key. Written in 1966 and was his debut single.
Waiting for the Great Leap Forwards	4:34	Billy Bragg	From 1988 album, Workers Playtime - originally had the subtitle "Capitalism Is Killing Music". This was released as a single and features backing vocals by Michelle Shocked.
1979	4:26	The Smashing Pumpkins	Released in 1996 as the second single from their third studio album, Mellon Collie and the Infinite Sadness. In the year 1979, Billy Corgan was 12 and this is what he considered his transition into adolescence.

Pump It Up	3:18	Elvis Costello	1978, appeared on Costello's second album This Year's Model, which was the first he recorded with the backing group the Attractions.
Slippery People	4:01	Talking Heads	Originally recorded on Speaking in Tongues, 1983, this the version performed in the 1983 film Stop Making Sense
Looking For Lewis And Clark	4:01	The Long Ryders	The Lewis and Clark Expedition was the first American expedition to cross what is now the western portion of the United States, departing in 1804.
Burlesque	4:06	Family	Formed in Late 1966 in Leicester, shortly after joined by Ric Grech and Roger Chapman. From Bandstand, sixth studio album, 1972.
Breakfast In America	2:39	Supertramp	Sixth album by the progressive rock band, released 1979. In France, the album is the biggest-selling English-language album of all time.
Der Hund Von Baskerville	2:52	Cindy And Bert	Known for their participation in the 1974 Eurovision Song Contest.
Plastic man	3:26	The Temptations	Masterpiece - 1973 album, produced and written by Norman Whitfield.
Street Life	3:29	Roxy Music	1973, opening track of Roxy Music's third album Stranded, their first album with Eddie Jobson on keyboards, who replaced Brian Eno.
The Spider And The Fly	3:38	Rolling Stones	On the US version of their 1965 album Out of Our Heads. In the UK it was released as the B-side to "(I Can't Get No) Satisfaction".
Crazy Horses	2:33	The Osmonds	November 1972. A protest about the amount of pollution created by cars.
