	Backslap	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
	The Walkin' Blues (Walk Right In, Walk Right Out)	2:56	Jesse Powell Orchestra Feat. Fluffy Hunter	1924 - 1982, was an American tenor saxophonist. He worked with Hot Lips Page, Louis Armstrong, and Luis Russell. He joined Count Basie's Band in 1946.
	Roll 'Em Pete	3:13	Count Basie & Joe Williams	1956, Joe Williams' debut as the featured vocalist in Count Basie's band
	Jumpin' Jack Flash (Live)	4:26	Johnny Winter	Born cross-eyed and albino in 1944. Original by the Stones in 1968. From Live Johnny Winter And, 1971 album recorded in New York and Florida.
	Willin'	2:55	Little Feat	From eponymous debut album in 1972, about a truck driver in the American southwest who makes some extra cash smuggling cigarettes and transporting illegals across the border from Mexico. Slide guitar by Ry Cooder
	The Weight	4:39	The Band	From 1968 debut album Music from Big Pink. About a visitor's experiences in a town called Nazareth, from which the Scottish band Nazareth later took its name.
	fortunate son	2:21	Creedence Clearwater Revival	Featured on album Willy and the Poor Boys, released 1969. An anti-war anthem, criticising militant patriotic behavior and those who support the use of military force without having to "pay the costs" themselves
	Living In The Past	3:21	Jethro Tull	1969
	Heartattack And Vine	4:51	Tom Waits	Heartattack and Vine was Tom Waits' last album on the Asylum label, released in 1980. Takes its name from Hollywood and Vine in Hollywood. Covered by Screamin' Jay Hawkins and featured in the Levi's commercial - Waits sued
	Cinnamon Girl	3:02	Neil Young	Debuted on the 1969 album Everybody Knows This Is Nowhere, which was also Young's first album with backing band Crazy Horse
	(Ghost) Riders In The Sky	3:46	Johnny Cash	The original version by Stan Jones, recorded in 1948. Cash's version from 1979.
	Bimbo	2:48	Jim Reeves	Died in a plane crash 50 years ago on this day. Reeves was the pilot. Coincidentally, both Reeves and Randy Hughes, the pilot of Patsy Cline's ill-fated airplane, were trained by the same instructor. This an early hit from 1953.
	Mohair Sam	2:08	Charlie Rich	1965, also covered by Peggy Lee, Tom Jones and The Coasters
	Bed and Breakfast Man	2:34	Madness	Debut album 1979. About Jon Hasler, their manager and was very important to putting the band together. "He'd turn up at our house, and next thing you knew he was there for breakfast, eating the kids' leftovers"
	Too Hot	3:10	The Specials	Released in 1979 on Jerry Dammers' 2 Tone label, the album is seen by some as the defining moment in the UK ska scene. Produced by Elvis Costello. A Prince Buster original from 1966
	On My Radio	3:01	The Selecter	Released in 1979 it reached 8, on the UK charts. Songs written by Neol Davies, the voice and rude girl style of Pauline Black and the rhythms of Desmond Brown on the Hammond organ.
	Do You Remember Rock 'N' Roll Radio?	3:51	Ramones	1980, second single of their fifth studio album End of the Century. The song claims that rock and roll is dying, and it needs change if it wants to survive. Produced by Phil Spector.
	Pyjamarama	2:54	Roxy Music	Released as a single in March 1973, to promote their For Your Pleasure album, though it was not on the album itself
	Pool Hall Richard	4:26	Faces	1973. formed in 1969 by members of the Small Faces after Marriott left group to form Humble Pie. The remaining Small Faces - Ian McLagan, Ronnie Lane and Kenney Jones - were joined by Ronnie Wood and Rod Stewart, both from the Jeff Beck Group,
	Pick Up The Pieces	4:00	Average White Band	Appears on the album AWB (1974). AWB was formed in early 1972 in Dundee
	Sweet Inspiration	2:54	The Sweet Inspirations	Founded by Emily "Cissy" Houston, mother of Whitney Houston. They backed Dusty Springfield on her album Dusty in Memphis. In 1969, they began recording and touring with Elvis Presley as both background singers and his warm-up act.
	Joe 90	1:59	The Barry Gray Orchestra	Best known for his many collaborations with television and film producer Gerry Anderson - Thunderbirds, Fireball XL5, Stingray, Captain Scarlet and the Mysterons and Joe 90 as well live-action series of the 1970s, such as UFO and Space: 1999.
	Too Darn Soulful	2:31	Morris Chestnut	Featured on BBC Northern Soul: Living for the Weekend
