Backslop	2:33	Baby Earl & The Trinidads	
Pink Cadillac	3:32	Bruce Springsteen	Released as the non-album B-side of "Dancing in the Dark" in 1984. Like Prince's "Little Red Corvette" and Wilson Pickett's "Mustang Sally" it uses automobile travel as a metaphor for bedroom activity.
The Four Mills Brothers	1:30	Van Dyke Parks	Parks is perhaps best known for his collaborations with musician Brian Wilson, and especially for his contributions as lyricist to the Beach Boys' Smile project. From Discover America, a 1972 album featuring Parks' take on Calypso music.
One Black Night	3:37	Champion Doug Veitch	Born 1960, is a Scottish musician and songwriter. The 'King of Caledonian Swing' rose to some prominence in the mid 1980s. A favourite of John Peel. He holds the record for having most (six) consecutive NME singles of the week. This from 1985.
Fisherman's Blues	4:23	Waterboys	From album of same name, 1988, their best selling. They changed their rock sound for a mixture of traditional Irish and Scottish music.
Ain't Got No Home	2:22	Clarence Henry	His 1956 debut hit, with his trademark croak earned Henry his nickname of "Frogman". Henry opened eighteen concerts for the Beatles across the US and Canada in 1964
I'm Your Puppet	3:00	James & Bobby Purify	1966, had a hit 10 years later with 'Morning Glory' (albeit with a different Bobby). Written by Dewey "Spooner" Oldham and Dan Penn
What	2:15	Judy Street	1968 northern soul classic. Covered by Soft Cell in 1982.
Needle In A Haystack	2:30	The Velvelettes	Single from 1964, produced by Norman Whitfield
Mack The Knife	4:42	Ella Fitzgerald	From 1960 live album Ella in Berlin. Won Grammy for Best Vocal Performance, Female. She improvised the lyrics after forgetting the original ones.
Prairie Rose	5:13	Roxy Music	Written by Bryan Ferry / Phil Manzanera, from 1974 album Country Life. An ode to The to Texas and one of its daughters, Jerry Hall, who appeared on the cover of Siren (1975), and later in the video to Ferry's hit single "Let's Stick Together".
There There My Dear	3:33	Dexys Midnight Runners	1980, from Searching for the Young Soul Rebels. It was produced by Pete Wingfield, who had previously recorded the hit single "Eighteen with a Bullet". Mojo summed up the album as "an energetic mix of pop, Northern soul and punkish attitude.
Pata Pata	2:57	Miriam Makeba	The first artist from Africa to popularize African music around the world. First recorded in 1957 and released in the U.S. in 1967.
What A Way To End It All	2:57	Deaf School	Formed in Liverpool in 1973. Between 1976 and 1978 they recorded three albums for the Warner Brothers label. Guitarist Clive Langer would go on to produce Madness and Dexys Midnight Runners. He also co-wrote the song 'Shipbuilding'.
Baby Let's Play House	2:18	Elvis Presley	Written by Arthur Gunter and recorded by him in 1954. A year later, it was the fourth issue of a Presley record by Sun. He replaced Gunter's line "You may get religion" with the words "You may have a Pink Cadillac".
Trouble~Guitar Man	3:27	Elvis Presley	The show opener from the NBC-TV Special in 1968, commonly referred to as the '68 Comeback Special. Trouble originally from 1958 film King Creole.
Waiting for the Great Leap Forwards	4:34	Billy Bragg	From 1988 album, Workers Playtime - originally had the subtitle "Capitalism Is Killing Music". This was released as a single and features backing vocals by Michelle Shocked.
Dancing Barefoot	4:16	Patti Smith	Released as a second single from Patti Smith Group's 1979 album Wave.
Do You Dream In Colour?	3:46	Bill Nelson	Was involved in Be-Bop Deluxe in mid 70s. 1981, from Quit Dreaming and Get on the Beam - one of his more rockier efforts.
Spanish Stroll	3:38	Mink De Ville	Mink DeVille (1974–86) was a rock band known for its association with early punk rock bands at New York's CBGB nightclub and for being a showcase for the music of Willy DeVille (real name Billy Borsay). 1977, their only record ever to chart in the UK
Back To The Island	4:31	Leon Russell	Born Claude Russell Bridges April 2, 1942. From 1975 album, Will O' the Wisp.
The Seventh Seal	4:56	Scott Walker	From Scott 4, 1969.
(White Man) In Hammersmith Palais	4:01	The Clash	1978. Recounts an all-night reggae "showcase" night at the Hammersmith Palais in Shepherd's Bush Road, London, that was attended by Joe Strummer and Don Letts.
