Tobacco Road	2:45	John D. Loudermilk	Primarily known as a songwriter. His best-known songs include "Indian Reservation", a 1971 hit for Paul Revere & the Raiders; "Tobacco Road", a 1964 hit for the Nashville Teens. Died in September, aged 82.
That's All Right	1:58	Elvis Presley	Best known for his backing of Elvis Presley in the first part of his career, between 1954 and the beginning of Elvis's Hollywood years. Rolling Stone magazine ranked him 29th in a list of 100 Greatest Guitarists of all time.
The Night Has A Thousand Eyes	2:35	Bobby Vee	Robert Thomas Velline, had 10 top 20 hits. His career began in the midst of tragedy. When Buddy Holly died in a plane crash whilst on tour, Vee was given the unenviable job of filling in for the rest of the tour.
Desperados Waiting for a Train	4:32	Guy Clark	The New York Times described him as "a king of the Texas troubadours". Members of the Western Writers of America chose this as one of the Top 100 Western songs of al time.
Roll Away the Stone	3:56	Leon Russell	1970, his first single. He wrote Delta Lady for Joe Cocker, The Carpenters with their 1971 hit Superstar and George Benson with This Masquerade. Written by Ian Hunter.
All The Young Dudes	3:30	Mott The Hoople	Drummer and founding member Dale "Buffin" Griffin died in January. Also produced many John Peel sessions, including first professional recording session for Pulp in 1981.
Trapped	3:59	Colonel Abrams	An American musician, singer, songwriter, dancer and actor. A top ten hit in Germany, Ireland, the Netherlands and the UK in 1985.
Boogie Nights	3:36	Heatwave	This fom 1977, Rod Temperton on keyboards. Wrote Michael Jackson's Thriller, as well as Off The Wall and Rock With You. Died October, aged 66.
Star	4:24	Earth, Wind & Fire	Maurice "Moe" White, founder and lead singer of Earth, Wind & Fire. 1979, from 9th album, I Am.
First We Take Manhattan	6:02	Leonard Cohen	It was originally recorded by Jennifer Warnes on her 1986 album Famous Blue Raincoat, which consisted almost entirely of songs written or co-written by Cohen. His version released in 1988 as the first track on his album I'm Your Man.
It's No Game	4:21	David Bowie	Written by David Bowie as the first track on 1980 album Scary Monsters (And Super Creeps), featuring lead guitar played by Robert Fripp.
This Is How It Feels	3:13	Inspiral Carpets	Drummer Craig Gill died last month. The band was a part of the late 1980s and early 1990s Madchester movement. This was their biggest hit, peaking at number 14 in 1990.
Fanfare For The Common Man	2:59	Emerson, Lake & Palmer	From the 1977 Works Volume I album. Adapted by Keith Emerson from Aaron Copland's 1942 composition. Emerson was a founding member of Emerson, Lake & Palmer, he wrote and arranged much of their music.
Heartache Tonight	4:27	The Eagles	Included on their album The Long Run and released as a single in 1979. Features Glenn Frey on lead vocals. He also co-wrote the song with Don Henley, Bob Seger and J. D. Souther. Had a big solo hit with The Heat Is On in 1984.
Mama Tried	2:15	Merle Haggard	Spent most of his late teens and twenties in various prisons, mostly for burglary and robbery. Was transferred to San Quentin Prison in 1958 where he saw a performance by Johnny Cash at the prison in 1959 and was inspired to form a prison band.
Parchman Farm	3:20	Mose Allison	He is described as having been "one of the finest songwriters in 20th-century blues." He became notable for playing a unique mix of blues and modern jazz. He played piano with the saxists Stan Getz, Zoot Sims and Gerry Mulligan. This from 1957.
Thanks for Saving My Life	2:57	Billy Paul	Paul Williams, was a Grammy Award-winning American soul singer, best known for his 1972 single, "Me and Mrs. Jones". This from his 1973 album War of the Gods. He was associated with the Philadelphia soul sound.
100 Days, 100 Nights	3:46	Sharon Jones & The Dap-Kings	She was of part a revivalist movement that aims to capture the essence of funk and soul music as it was at its height in the mid-1960s to mid-70s. This from 3rd album, 100 Days, 100 Nights, recorded late 2006.
sign 'o' the times	4:57	prince	The lead single from his 1987 album of the same name - addresses various problems including AIDS, gang violence, natural disasters, poverty, drug abuse, the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster and impending nuclear holocaust. Died aged 57 in April
Can I Kick It?	4:04	A Tribe Called Quest	Malik Izaak Taylor, known professionally as Phife Dawg (or simply Phife), was an American rapper and a member of the group A Tribe Called Quest. He died in March due to complications relating to diabetes at the age of 45. This from 1991.
The Floral Dance	3:12	Terry Wogan	First recorded in 1912 by the Australian bass/baritone Peter Dawson, it was a number 21 hit for Terry in 1978. His BBC Radio 2 breakfast programme had eight million regular listeners, making him the most listened-to radio broadcaster in Europe.
