Bad Penny Blues	2:40	Humphrey Lyttleton Band	1956, the first British jazz record to get into the Top Twenty, and stayed there for six weeks.
Shake Your Moneymaker	2:57	Fleetwood Mac	Originally recorded by Elmore James in 1961. This version by the original Fleetwood Mac on their debut album, 1968
Working For The Yankee Dollar	3:40	The Skids	UK No. 20 in 1979, from their second album Days in Europa
Love On A Farmboy's Wages	3:59	XTC	1983. From Swindon, England, led by songwriters Andy Partridge and Colin Moulding and active between 1976 and 2005, but retired from live performance in 1982.
Brass in Pocket	3:03	Pretenders	Their 3rd single from debut album, number one for two weeks in January 1980.
Opportunities (Let's Make Lots of Money)	3:45	Pet Shop Boys	1985, a satire of Thatcherism and its embodiment in conspicuous consumption and yuppies in the UK during the 1980s.
Ain't There Something That Money Can't Buy	3:07	The Young Holt Trio	1967, on the Brunswick label. From Chicago, formerly members of Ramsey Lewis' jazz trio.
Money's Too Tight To Mention	4:07	The Valentine Brothers	John and William "Billy" Valentine. 1982, covered by Simply Red in 1985. Billy Valentine performed as a singer with Young-Holt Unlimited in the mid-1970s.
For The Love Of Money	3:47	The O'Jays	1973, written and produced by Gamble and Huff for Philadelphia Records. The song's title comes from a Biblical verse, 1 Timothy 6:10: "For the love of
Cash On The Barrelhead/Hickory Wind	6:26	Gram Parsons	Written by Charlie and Ira Louvin, known as the Louvin Brothers in 1956. From his 1974 album Grievous Angel, as part of the "Medley Live from Northern Quebec" - noteworthy for its faked live performance and guitar work of James Burton
M-0-N-E-Y	3:18	Lyle Lovett	From Pontiac, his second studio album, released in 1987. The album also has Emmylou Harris on Vocals and Background Vocals
Busted	2:14	Ray Charles	Johnny Cash had the first hit with this in 1963, Ray's version was later that year.
The Gambler	3:34	Kenny Rogers	Released in November 1978 as the title track from his album The Gambler. The song gave the bearded crooner his nickname and provides some of the best financial advice ever in a song.
Rich Girl	2:24	Hall & Oates	1977, about a spoiled girl who can rely on her parents' money to do whatever she wants. Was the first of 6 US number 1s.
Lovely Money	5:20	The Damned	1982, voiceover provided by former Bonzo Dog Doo-Dah Band frontman Viv Stanshall
It's Yer Money I'm After Baby	2:47	The Wonder Stuff	Single from 1988. Miles Hunt on vocals and guitar - whose uncle Bill Hunt was keyboard player with ELO and Wizzard
Offshore Banking Business	6:26	The Members	Got to 31 in UK singles chart, 1979. Previous single was "The Sound of the Suburbs"
Money In My Pocket	2:33	Dennis Brown	Bob Marley cited Brown as his favourite singer, dubbing him "The Crown Prince of Reggae". Reached number 14 in 1977.
Ain't Got No Money	4:15	Bob Seger & The Silver Bullet Band	From his 10th studio album, Stranger in Town, 1978 (his first album to chart in the UK). Witten by Frankie Miller.
Taxman	2:42	The Beatles	1966, from Revolver album. Attacks the high levels of tax introduced by the British Labour government of Harold Wilson. Only album on which Harrison has 3 songs.
Mercedes Benz	1:48	Janis Joplin	1970. She got the idea for this song after riding in Bobby Womack's new Mercedes 600. In the '90s, Mercedes used this in commercials for their cars - perhaps one of the great misappropriations of a song in a commercial

Take The Money And Run	2:52	Steve Miller Band	From 1970 album Fly Like an Eagle. About two young bandits and the police officer pursuing them.
